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Reflections of a Shepherd

July Fourth is a special day for America. Indeed, it is a special day for humanity. The reason being it is the day that we as Americans celebrate our freedom, our liberty. (And by Americans I mean residents of the United States of America, though recently the term is being co-opted to mean anyone who lives in the American continents). It is the celebration of the birth of our nation, The Great American Experiment as it is sometimes called. It truly is a great day! But freedom, as it is commonly understood today, is a lie; or, at the very least, it is a myth that goes beyond the bounds of logical reason or conventional wisdom. Let me

When our Founding Fathers established our country they set forth to ensure her citizens what was deemed to be "unalienable rights" given to us by our "Creator." Thus our freedom was guaranteed to us by the Almighty Father. As such, our rights would be restrained by things such as morality and ethics. However, today, when many say "freedom;" what they really mean is the "right" to be able to do whatever I want, whenever I want, to whomever I want without the interference of anyone else. Unless of course, what you want is to own a firearm, or pray in school, or object to the moral decline of this country. Our society wants the "right" to be able to do anything they wish without regard to how these actions might impede or infringe on someone else's rights. When they say "free society" what they are really insisting on is anarchy. What they want is the "right" to be able to do what is right in their own eyes.

An astute Bible student will recognize this phrase from the book of Judges. The book of Judges contains some of the most graphic descriptions of the human capacity for violence; as well as the results of this understanding of "freedom." Think about

it, when "everyone did what was right in their own eyes" we have a king eviscerated while he is as my Grandma would say, "sitting" (3:20ff). We have a woman seducing a man in order to drive a stake through his skull (4:17-21). We have a man, who was the son of a prostitute, sacrificing his daughter to Yahweh (11:30-40). We have the Benjamites gang raping a concubine who is then butchered by her owner (19:20-31). In retaliation, the rest of the nation almost decimates the tribe, by my count 90.000 to 108,000 Benjamites died (20:19-48).

Doesn't "freedom" sound grand? Doesn't it sound like paradise? When "everyone does what is right in their own eyes" the results are a land ruled by fear and violence. It isn't the land of the free and the home of the brave. It's more like the land of the fierce and the home of the brutal. Unfettered freedom isn't freedom at all; it's anarchy. Freedom and liberty can't mean that "everyone does what is right in their own eyes."

As Americans we have allowed freedom to be defined by the world and as a result, we now have mother's with the "right" to rip their own children from their womb. We have the government forcing Christians to celebrate same-sex marriage, recognizing one's right while denying another's. We're being denied our "freedom of speech" by accusing us of "hate speech." When "everyone does what is right in their own eyes" no one does, because "every inclination of the human heart is evil all the time" (Gen. 6:5). I believe our Founding Fathers understood that; it is time that we did too.
