It all started in 1620 when the Pilgrims first arrived in New England at Plymouth Rock. The winter that year was extremely harsh and nearly half of the 102 new settlers died. The following year saw a severe drought and where if not for the graciousness of the Native American Squanto and the faithfulness of God, it is likely that the rest of the surviving Pilgrims would have perished in the following years. But that year, Squanto taught the Pilgrims how to plant corn and other native plants, and a fast was declared to ask for God's blessings. And bless them He did! The harvest was bountiful and that year a grand feast was held celebrating and thanking God for His gracious provision. Another day of thanks was declared in 1623 and again in 1676.

Thanksgiving as a national holiday did not begin for a hundred more years and the credit for the idea goes to Sarah Hale. Ms. Hale grew up in New Hampshire where the Thanksgiving tradition was common place. However, in other parts of the country, particularly the South, the holiday was unknown and she was determined to make it the American tradition it has become today. For over forty years, she wrote "Hale Mail" to congressman, senators, and even five presidents (including Abraham Lincoln). She wrote several editorial columns in her magazine Godev's Ladv's Book in support of it as well. Finally, in October of 1863, at the height of the civil war, Abraham Lincoln declared the national holiday in hopes to heal the wounds the war was causing. Here is an excerpt:

For her Thanksgiving is about praising and thanking God for the gifts He has bestowed in the past and continues to bestow in the present. Unfortunately, for many Thanksgiving has become a secular holiday where turkey and football are king and God has been left behind. Some even refer to it as "Turkey Day" to drive home the point. But we know that Thanksgiving was a day set aside by our leadership in which we would give thanks for the blessings our Creator had given us in the preceding year.

It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and voice by the whole American people. I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens. And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to his tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility and Union.

The holiday is Thanksgiving, not "Turkey Day." It's not just a day of food, family, and football. It's not the just the kickoff to the Christmas season. No Thanksgiving is most assuredly not a secular holiday. It is a most assuredly a religious one and it always has been. The pilgrims knew it. Sarah Hale knew it. Abraham Lincoln knew it. This Thanksgiving, make sure that you remember it too.
